

Relative to much of the world, we live out of a place of privilege. We live out of an abundance of resources that provide us with unparalleled opportunities. During this season of gift giving, we have an opportunity to share out of the abundance with which we have been entrusted. There are people who suffer hunger, food insecurity, and lack of access to the nutrition necessary for life and health. With the Holy Spirit working in, with, and through us, we have an opportunity to bring relief, instill hope, and end hunger and poverty wherever it exists.

This Advent, we will have the opportunity participate in the ELCA World Hunger campaign by supporting God's Global Barnyard. Resources, which include a family Advent calendar, an Advent study booklet, and a "Barnyard Pastor Trent


Council Minutes not available this month

Holly was first used by pagans to decorate for the festival of Saturnalia.
When Christians began celebrating Christmas in

honor of Christ, they adapted that decorating practice to reflect Jesus' life and death. Holly's pointed leaves symbolize the crown of thorns and its red berries symbolize Christ's blood shed on the cross. Because holly thrives and its berries retain their brilliance even in harsh winter conditions, non-Christians saw it as a symbol of eternity — which is fitting for Christians as well.

STAR OF STAIL FULL


Make a mobile to remind you of Jesus' birth.

What you need:

- Paper plate
- Hole punch
- Thin blue ribbon
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Yellow craft foam
- Marker

What you do:


- With the paper plate upside down, punch evenly spaced holes along the rim. Gently fold the plate and punch a hole in the center.
- Cut pieces of ribbon, thread them through the holes as desired and tie the ribbons securely.
- Trace several small stars and one larger star on the foam and cut them out. Punch a hole atop a point of each star.

A Light Shines in the Darkness

In Nepal, where blindness is prevalent due to under-funded medical care and a lack of eye doctors, ophthalmologist Sanduk Ruit has made it his mission to treat poor people. He's performed more than 130,000 cataract surgeries to restore sight, sometimes walking for a week with surgical equipment in tow to reach patients. Dr. Ruit also found a way for replacement lenses to be made locally for less than \$3 each, rather than buying them internationally for 100 times as much. The physician brings healing to remote villages and celebrates "big eye-opening festivals" with people who "were blind yesterday, and ... are seeing today."

At Christmas we celebrate the Word of God who came to live among us as Jesus, the light of the world. In countless ways since, God has brought light to those living in literal or figurative darkness.

We celebrate people, such as Dr. Ruit and the 650 doctors he has trained, whom God uses to cause "light [to shine] in the darkness" (John 1:5)
