At the Marguette commencement ceremony, the student speaker, Jacob Zelinski, shared, "We carry a lot on our hearts. We etch in lessons and love and Christ's words right on top. When we etch things into our hearts, they become part of us, for it's in the heart's breaking that these etchings seep into who we are as human beings — emphasis on the being."

Considering Jacob's words, my thoughts moved to keynote speaker Pastor Sunitha Mortha's message at Synod Assembly. She asked us to consider the questions, "Who is our neighbor?" and "What is mission?" Pastor Mortha challenged us to consider how the story of mission is being formed and informed.

FROM THE PASTOR (continued):

We will walk with each other, we will walk side by side..

Historically, the human concept of mission has been a one-way relationship based on assumptions – that someone has a need and we know best how to meet the need. This view is shortsighted. This view only sees a problem to be fixed and misses seeing the person.

Mission doesn't belong to us. Mission belongs to God and humanity is invited to participate in it, not the other way around. Mission is rooted in relationship. Mission is accompaniment, whereas accompaniment is defined as, "Walking together in solidarity that practices mutual hospitality." Accompaniment is listening deeply to one another.

Right now, we have a listening problem. Too may people believe that they have the "right" answer, so everyone else must be wrong. Too many people believe that their way is best, so any other way is inferior. Too may people believe that the only way to move forward to accomplish anything in this world is to speak louder than anyone else, so no one else can be heard. So now what?

Maybe Jacob Zeliniski is on to something. Perhaps our hearts need to

break for Christ's words to seep in through the cracks and for the Holy Spirit to work in, with, and through us. Perhaps we need to let go of our efforts to make self-protection our priority. Perhaps we need to become vulnerable. Perhaps we need to take down the fences around our hearts so that we can others in.

The Holy Spirit comes to us so that we may live, love, and listen. So that we may listen to the voices that are different from ours. So that we may love fully. So that we may live out our baptismal callings. So now what? Listen. Listen deeply. Listen deeply to one another. Listen deeply to one another while walking together practicing mutual hospitality. This is how we are

invited to participate in God's mission. Can you feel your heart burning?



We also want to celebrate with Kaden Borkovetz and his family as he affirmed his faith during a worship service at Bay View Lutheran on Sunday May 12th.


